NHMRC-Multiple Sclerosis Research Australia Translating Research Into Practice (TRIP) Fellowship

The National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC), in partnership with Multiple Sclerosis Research Australia (MSRA), are offering a TRIP Fellowship for a future leader in the uptake of evidence into clinical practice for multiple sclerosis (MS).

MSRA aims to substantially accelerate progress towards finding a cause and cure for MS. However, it is vital to ensure that the best available evidence, gained from research-to-date, is used to improve care for people with MS, their carers and families.

This Fellowship provides an opportunity for an early-to-mid career health professional to improve the translation of research findings for the management of MS, to improve care and outcomes.

The successful candidate will undertake an implementation research project and will have access to training, mentoring and support to become a leader in evidence uptake.

In addition to the criteria outlined in the *NHMRC TRIP Fellowships 2010 Guide for Applicants*, project proposals should nominate and address an important evidence-practice gap in the investigation, diagnosis and/or management of people with MS, for example:

- improving accessibility to information and professional assistance at the time of diagnosis, including improving health literacy
- promoting adherence to immunotherapy
- improving the evidence-based management of psychological symptoms in people with MS
